Show Rules Continued

3. Classification: The Classification committee reserves the right to combine and/or subdivide classes and refuse entries that are not considered to be of show quality or not conforming to the schedule. In classes requiring registered African violets, the registration number must be shown on the entry card.

4. Judging: The authority for judging shall be the *African Violet Society of America Handbook for African Violet Growers, Exhibitors and Judges*, 2016 edition and subsequent amendments The show will be judged by the merit system using AVSA judges and the AVSA scale of points applicable to each class. Only blue ribbon exhibits shall be eligible for any special awards. Judg-ing will take place after 9:30AM Saturday, Oct. 5th. All designs will be judged at eye-level. The decisions of the judges shall be final.

5. General Rules for Horticulture: Only clean healthy plants will be accepted. Only one entry of a particular variety is permitted in the same class but multiple entries of different varieties are allowed in the same class. An exhibitor is limited to one entry (three plants) in each collection class. All African violet varieties, species, and other gesneriads must be correctly named and grown by the exhibitor at least 90 days prior to show. AVSA registered varieties will state their number on the entry card. All African violet exhibits, must be in bloom except Class 39. All African violets must be single crown plants, except trailers and certain species as stated in the *AVSA Master Variety List* or *First Class*. Gesneriads other than African violets need not be in bloom and may be shown for uniqueness and ornamental value, Classes 27, 29, 31, 33 and 35. All plants must be displayed in clean, neutral colored pots, with the exception of Classes 20, 24, & 25, and Sections VIII & XII. Class 49 is an educational exhibit for residents of Cathedral Village only and will not be judged by AVSA judges.

6. General Rules for Design: Niche reservations must be made in advance. After the close of reservations on October 4th, exhibitors may enter additional designs in the same class, provided the class limit is not filled. Design entries shall be staged in white niches unless otherwise noted. Accessories and backdrops are permitted in those classes. The niches may have narrow sides but represent the space as stated in the schedule. All design entries must be accompanied by a 3"x 5" white index card listing the names of the African violet varieties used and all other plant materials. African violet plants, blossoms, and other plant materials, need not be grown by the exhibitor, but all exhibits shall be their exclusive work. Blossoms and design materials should be kept fresh looking throughout the show. The American flag, state flags and flags from other nations, plants on the endangered list from any state or nation, artificial plant material, and live creatures shall not be used in any design division exhibit.

7. Disclaimer of Responsibility: AVSP will try to provide all possible protection, but ultimately all exhibits shall be shown at the risk of the exhibitor.

How to See the Show

The show consists of African violets and other gesneriads, all members of the same plant family. The Horticulture Division is divided according to plant type, size, blossom color, leaf type, etc. The Design Division is where we use African violet blossoms or plants, removed from their pot, to create an imaginative design conforming to the title of the class, theme of the show, and the rules as stated in the schedule.

The exhibits are merit judged by qualified African violet judges according to point scales established by the *African Violet Society of America*, *Inc.* (AVSA) It is not enough for a plant to have the most blossoms or be the largest. Points may be lost during judging for dead blossoms, marred leaves, poor shape, wrong pot size, etc.

SHOW RULES

1. Membership and Eligibility: Exhibitors must be members of AVS of Philadelphia (AVSP) except in class 1, 2, 3, 24, 25, & 49. Exhibitors in classes 1, 2, & 3 must be members of The African Violet Society of America (AVSA) and indicate their membership number on the entry form. Exhibitors in Class 6 must be a member of The Mid-Atlantic African Violet Society (MAAVS). Exhibitors in Novice class 23 may not have previously won a blue ribbon in horticulture. Only AVSP members are eligible for major awards.

2. Entries: All entries shall be presented on Friday, Oct. 4th, between 10 AM and 4 PM, or by appointment. All designs must be entered and registered Friday, Oct. 4th, but may be placed in niches anytime until 9:00 AM Saturday. No entry shall be removed before 4 PM Saturday, Oct. 5th.

- Class 39. Green Cheese? Many stories in mythology infer that the reflection of the moon is a round wheel of green cheese. Create a plant arrangement using an African violet plant(s) with foliage only (no flowers). Niche 20"H x 15"W x 15"D. Limit 4.
- Class 40. 2001: A Space Odyssey: In the beginning of the movie a large monolithic machine built by extraterrestrials appears on prehistoric earth. Create a free-standing plant arrangement that characterizes this event. Staged on a white table cover with a base no larger than 12"W and 12"D, but any height. Viewed from the front only. Limit 4.
- Section XI: Interpretive Flower Arrangements: Designs using cut African violet blossoms, foliage and other cut plant material, fresh or dried. No artificial plant material may be used.
 - Class 41. Milky Way: There are so many stars in the Milky Way that it appears as a milky band of light in the night sky. Create a kinetic flower design that is suspended from one or more rods. Niche is 20"H x 15"W x 15"D, Limit 4.
 - Class 42. Constellations: A constellation is a group of stars forming an imaginary pattern in the sky representing an animal, mythological person or creature, a god, or an inanimate object. Choose a constellation and create a flower arrangement to represent it. Identify your constellation on your entry card. Niche 10"H x 8"W x 8"D, Limit 6.
 - Class 43. Black Hole: A black hole is a gravitational field so strong that it condenses matter and light making the area look dark. Create a flower arrangement that contains a black object. Niche 15"H x 12"W x 12"D, Limit 4
 - Class 44. Saturn: The planet Saturn is a massive ball surrounded by 62 moons and a dazzling system of icy rings, Create a miniature flower arrangement containing rings. Niche 7"H x 5"Wx 5" D, Limit 6.
 - Class 45. Sea of Tranquility: Neil Armstrong in Apollo 11 was the first man to stand in the moon's Sea of Tranquility. In a clear transparent container, create a floral design with all components completely submerged in water and using African violet blossoms.

- Class 7. Mixed Collection. A collection of three different types of African violets. Only one plant of each type may be included: standard, trailer, semiminiature, miniature, or species. Varieties need not be registered.
